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unlike the earthquakes and hurricanes that have influenced caribbean history the region s fires have almost always been caused by humans geographer bonham c richardson explores the effects of fire in the social and ecological history of the british lesser antilles from the british virgin islands south to trinidad focusing on the late nineteenth century leading to the 1905 withdrawal of british military forces from the region richardson shows how fire lit social upheavals served as forerunners of political independence movements drawing on caribbean and london archives as well as years of fieldwork richardson examines how villagers used modified and contemplated fire in part to vent their frustrations with a savage economic depression and social and political inequities imposed from afar he examines fire in all its forms from protest torches to sugarcane fires that threatened the islands economic staple richardson illuminates a neglected period in caribbean history by showing how local uses of fire have been catalysts and even causes of important changes in the region

when americans seek an escape from the worries and dilemmas of everyday life the crystal blue waters and white sands of the caribbean islands seem like the answer to a prayer yet this image

of a tourist's paradise hides a tumultuous history marked by strife and division over race, political power and economic inequality. Olwyn Blouet explores the story of the Caribbean over the last 50 years, revealing it to be a region positioned at the heart of some of the most prominent geopolitical issues of modern times. Navigating a rich *mélange* of cultures and histories, Blouet unearths a complex narrative that is frequently overlooked in histories of the Americas. In stark contrast to widely read guidebooks, this chronicle unflinchingly probes two strikingly different worlds in the Caribbean islands: those of the haves and the have-nots. Created by the volatile mixture of colonial politics, racial segregation and economic upheaval, the strategic political relations between Caribbean nations, Cuba in particular, and the world powers during the Cold War, the economic transformations instigated by tourism and the modernizing efforts of Caribbean nations in order to meet the demands of a globalizing twenty-first century market are among the numerous issues explored by Blouet in her efforts to redress the historical record's imbalance. The contemporary Caribbean also explores the proud histories of the region's many nations in sports such as cricket and baseball, as well as their famed cuisines and the uneasy balance today between local traditions and the vestiges of colonial influence.

A quiet revolution is taking place in America's forests, once seen primarily as stands of timber. Our woodlands are now prized as a rich source of a wide range of commodities, from wild mushrooms and maple sugar to hundreds of medicinal plants whose uses have only begun to be fully realized. Now as timber harvesting becomes more mechanized and requires less labor, the image of the lumberjack is being replaced by that of the forager. This book provides the first comprehensive examination of nontimber forest products (NTFPs) in the United States, illustrating their diverse importance, describing the people who harvest them, and outlining the steps that are being taken to ensure access to them. As the first extensive national overview of NTFP policy and management specific to the United States, it brings together research from numerous disciplines and analytical perspectives, such as economics, mycology, history, ecology, law, entomology, forestry, geography, and anthropology, in order to provide a cohesive picture of the current and potential role of NTFPs. The contributors review the state of scientific knowledge of NTFPs by offering a survey of commercial and noncommercial products, an overview of uses and users, and discussions of sustainable management issues associated with ecology, cultural traditions, forest policy, and commerce. They examine some of the major social, economic, and biological benefits of NTFPs while also addressing the potential negative consequences of NTFP harvesting on forest ecosystems and on NTFP species populations. Within this wealth of information are rich accounts of NTFP use drawn from all parts of the American landscape, from the Pacific Northwest to the Caribbean, from honey production to a review of nontimber forest economies still active in the United States, such as the Ojibway harvest of plants. Recounted here, the book takes in the whole breadth of recent NTFP issues, including ecological concerns associated with the expansion of NTFP markets and NTFP tenure issues on federally managed lands. No other volume offers such a comprehensive overview of NTFPs in North America. By examining all aspects of these products, it contributes to the development of more sophisticated policy and management frameworks for not only ensuring their ongoing use but also protecting the future of our forests.
