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the fresh air book critic investigates the enduring power of the great gatsby the great american novel we all think we ve read but really haven t conceived nearly a century ago by a man who died believing himself a failure it s now a revered classic and a rite of passage in the reading lives of millions but how well do we really know the great gatsby as maureen corrigan gatsby lover extraordinaire points out while fitzgerald s masterpiece may be one of the most popular novels in america many of us first read it when we were too young to fully comprehend its power offering a fresh perspective on what makes gatsby great and utterly unusual so we read on takes us into archives high school classrooms and even out onto the long island sound to explore the novel s hidden depths a journey whose revelations include gatsby s surprising debt to hard boiled crime fiction its rocky path to recognition as a classic and its profound commentaries on the national themes of race class and gender with rigor wit and infectious enthusiasm corrigan inspires us to re experience the greatness of gatsby and cuts to the heart of why we are as a culture borne back

ceaselessly into its thrall along the way she spins a new and fascinating story of her own

the haunting enigmatic love story that turned murakami into a literary superstar in japan and is his bestselling title throughout the world autumn 1969 and soon i would be 20 when he hears her favourite beatles song toru watanabe recalls his first love naoko the girlfriend of his best friend kizuki immediately he is transported back almost twenty years to his student days in tokyo adrift in a world of uneasy friendships casual sex passion loss and desire to a time when an impetuous young woman called midori marches into his life and he has to choose between the future and the past such is the exquisite gossamer construction of murakami s writing that everything he chooses to describe trembles with symbolic possibility guardian poignant romantic and hopeless it beautifully encapsulates the heartbreak and loss of faith sunday times a masterly novel new york times

bell s prose is elegant and wonderfully readable in this artful guide publishers weekly the artful edit explores the many faceted and often misunderstood or simply overlooked art of editing the book brims with examples quotes and case studies including an illuminating discussion of max perkins s editorial collaboration with f scott fitzgerald on the great gatsby susan bell a veteran book editor also offers strategic tips and exercises for self editing and a series of remarkable interviews taking us into the studios of successful authors such as michael ondaatje and ann patchett to learn from their various approaches to revision much more than a manual the artful edit inspires readers to think about both the discipline and the creativity of editing and how it can enhance their work in the computer age of lightning quick composition this book reminds readers that editing is not simply a spell check a vigorous investigation into the history and meaning of the edit this book like the elements of style is a must have companion for every writer

this is the haunting and exquisitely crafted mystery of eddie conroy a brilliant but homeless middle aged man living in new york working as a dishwasher after a long military career conroy suffers from a multiple personality disorder that has no known cure alternating from the defensive posture of a street smart functional illiterate to the highly visible stature of an animal rights advocate when a 500 pound male bengal tiger escapes from the central park zoo during an animal rights demonstration conroy s close friend is brutally killed by the animal a logistical nightmare develops for the police who must take the unprecedented step of closing the park to all pedestrian and vehicular traffic until the tiger is captured or killed after several days and nights of intense searching by police officers the hungry and disoriented animal is spooked by gunfire and virtually all attempts at control and protection are lost throughout the upper east side a panic ensues exacerbated by sensation seeking media coverage mr minahan draws indelible and thought provoking parallel lines between the instinctive actions of the tiger and the intuitive insights of eddie conroy linking their lives

in a compelling metaphysical alliance that is difficult to forget

surely enough has been written about f scott fitzgerald the man who coined the jazz age and symbolized the roaring twenties whose very name conjures up a meteoric rise and an equally spectacular fall but the better question might be why has so much ink been spent on a writer who completed only four novels who fell from grace in the 1930s only to be resurrected twenty years later the answer according to the cultural critic arthur krystal is the problem that is fitzgerald drawn to the glitter of fame but aspiring to the empyrean heights of joseph conrad and james joyce fitzgerald careened from the perfection of the great gatsby to the hack world of hollywood screenwriting penning stories that were either brilliant distillations of the age or superficial works of fiction like america itself fitzgerald was a work in progress a self created and conflicted human being striving for ideals that neither he nor the nation could ever live up to beset by contradictions buoyed by hope fueled by alcohol unable to settle permanently in any one place fitzgerald possessed what john updike aptly described as an aptitude for chaos and a dream of order in this unusual and concise biography more a layering of impressions than a chronological guide krystal gives us not only the peripatetic and turbulent life of a cultural icon but also the intellectual sweep of a period in history that created our modern america some unfinished chaos delivers a nuanced portrait of a man whose various sides embodied the trends passions and pursuits of the imperfect society that both glorified and dismissed him

the plot is launched by english professor rigby short whose opera libretto 4000 is about to be performed at a large midwestern university the novel s cast is composed of a gaggle of graduate students some local singers and several professionals from the outside an esteemed japanese conductor appears on the scene along with a wisecracking director from philadelphia what happens short is asked when such a diverse group comes together they tell lies so they do splendidly there is the yarn about the innocent temptress from biloxi and the odd revenge she takes on the man who steals her away that one is topped by the tale of the fastest jeep in the world and a deadly race in the mexican foothills a graduate student contributes a chiller about a pack of man eating cats in his home town when they are not swapping whoppers and case histories the members of the troupe couple and uncouple in scenes that manage to be both erotic and clinically detached jealousies arise and a small epidemic of paranoia breaks out as opening night approaches

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
